While COVID-19 is a new disease we are still learning more about, individuals with behavioral health conditions and those who use tobacco can be at a greater risk of infection and could have worse outcomes from COVID-19.



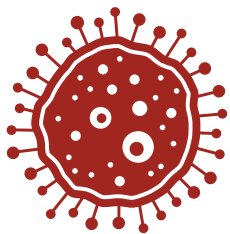
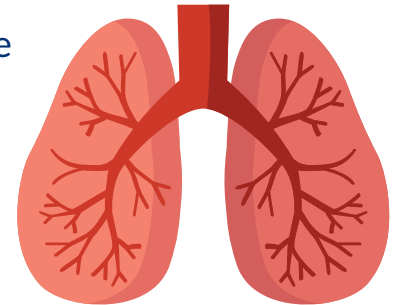
Increased risk of getting COVID-19

People who smoke or vape have a higher chance of getting COVID-19 from bringing their hands to their mouths which can transfer the virus into the body, and by sharing tobacco products such as e-cigarettes and hookah.

More vulnerable to COVID-19

Smoking and vaping have been shown to negatively affect the lungs and the immune system, putting those who smoke or vape at a greater risk of becoming infected and having worse outcomes from COVID-19.

People with opioid use disorder (OUD) and methamphetamine use disorder are also vulnerable due to those drugs' effects on respiratory and lung health.



Underlying health issues

Co-occurring conditions with smoking and vaping, such as, cardiovascular disease, obesity, hypertension, diabetes, chronic lung diseases (e.g. COPD) and other respiratory diseases, have been found to worsen outcomes in patients with other coronaviruses that affect the respiratory system including those that cause SARS and MERS.

WHAT CAN I DO TO PROTECT MY HEALTH?

In addition to social distancing recommendations, the World Health Organization (WHO) and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) **recommend those who smoke, vape, or use other tobacco products to quit completely.**
